

## A Message from Mayor James Líguorí



Dear Neighbors,

The Board of Trustees passed the 2022-2023 Village Budget in April which is explained in greater detail on page 2. Preparing a budget is not an exact science or an easy task. The Board of Trustees took the responsibility of determining the services that our residents need and desire, planning for anticipated expendi-

tures as well as unforeseeable ones. The budget is a result of much thought and hard work on the part of all concerned. I am pleased to announce a **slight tax decrease** for the upcoming fiscal year!

As you may have heard on June 1st we began providing Police Protection Service to the Village of Upper Brookville. This Board believes our Police Department to be one of the Village's biggest assets and was determined to create a long-term plan that provided the means to financially support the department. This was an important step in doing that. There is more information on this on page 3.

We are continuing to look forward to Spring and are pleased to announce that we awarded a bid for Roadwork in the Village in April. Repaving began on May 23rd and we expect it to be finished by the early Summer. Using grant funding Village Hall has gotten a facelift, the front façade was painted, new lighting, paint and windows in the courtroom, and new chairs for the public for Village meetings. We replaced the phone system at Village Hall and now all Village departments can be reached by calling the main number at, 516-364-3476.

Many residents have taken advantage of the Reconciliation "Amnesty" program which was set to expire but has been extended through October 31, 2022. Please reach out to the Building Department for more information at, 516-364-3476 option 3.



## 2022/2023 Víllage Budget at a Glance



Estimated expenditures in this year budget total \$6,388,618. From that, we subtract non-real estate tax revenues of \$3,138,153. This leaves a balance of \$3,250,465 which must be raised by real property taxes.

The total amount of taxes each property owner will pay is based upon the property's assessed value and the relationship it bears to the assessed value of the other properties in the Village. The average assessed value of a home in the Village is \$169,618. The Village Tax on this property would be \$2,880. The current year budget includes a property tax decrease!

Your Village taxes allow the Village to provide the following services: Village Police Protection, maintenance of public roads, snow plowing of public roads, safety inspections of properties, maintenance of zoning and other local laws, a board of appeals, and planning board and site and architectural review board services.

The Village does not have the power to create new revenue sources nor impose different taxes to reduce the real estate tax burden on property owners. We get no share of state income taxes, no funds from the town, and very little funding from the County, State, and Federal governments.

As always, the budget is constantly under review and we are continuously monitoring spending and looking for ways to reduce costs.

## Expansion of Police Service

The Board of Trustees believes our Police Department is vital to village safety, and maintaining the Department and the services it provides our residents was, and remains, our top priority. As of June 1st the Muttontown Police Department began providing police protection service to the Village of Upper Brookville. The former Old Brookville Police Department has dissolved, and we were approached by the Village of Upper Brookville to expand our Department's service to them. Entering into this agreement provides a substantial benefit to us financially and gives us the tools we need to support the Department in the long-term, for our residents and our exceptional officers, in a responsible manner.

## NYS Comptroller Fiscal Stress Rating of ZERO!

The Fiscal Stress Monitoring System examines financial information from local governments to determine the municipalities fiscal strength. Each municipality received a fiscal score and an environmental score. The fiscal score is based on data provided by the municipality including fund balance, operating expenses and revenues, cash assets, and debt. The environmental score is out of the control of the local government but looks at factors that could influence revenue-raising capability and demands for services that the local government will have to operate under.

We are proud to announce that our fiscal stress rating has decreased to the lowest possible level of 0 this year. The 2020 rating was 22.1, and 2021 rating was 3.3. The current year's environmental score is 16.7 We are proud that through continued fiscally responsible budgeting and decision making we have been able to bring the fiscal stress rating down to zero.

## Grant Funding

The Justice Court Assistance Program is an annual grant the Village Court can apply for. This year the Vil-

lage Court was awarded \$30,000 in grant funding which was used to purchase new chairs in the courtroom, to replace the windows and casings, lighting, and painting in the courtroom.

We filed with FEMA for reimbursement for the costs associated with Tropical Storm Isais July 30, 2020 and have received \$73,998 in funds from the Federal and State government.

In July 2021 the Village received \$188,102 in funds and anticipates in July 2022 another \$188,102 in funds under the American Rescue Plan Act, these funds wll be used to offset additional costs to the Village due to COVID-19.



## Volunteer Opportunities on Village Boards

The Village has three Boards with volunteers from the Village and appointed by the Mayor. These Boards include the Site and Architectural Review Board, Planning Board and Zoning Board of Appeals. The Mayor will be appointing residents to fill open positions in July, 2022. #### Amnesty Program Extended



The Reconciliation "Amnesty" Program has been extended through October 31, 2022 and will give residents an opportunity to legalize and maintain renovations, reconstruction and work performed without permits to their property. Residents who take advantage of this program will be responsible for a \$1,500 surcharge and permit fees required without the imposition of penalties for doing the work without a permit.

## Please check with the building department to see whether you are eligible for the program.

## Stormwater Management Plan

The Village is continuing in its efforts to reduce the impact on our tidal and freshwater wetlands from storm water runoff. A major component of this program is the prevention of pollutants, such as pathogen containing pet wastes, trash, petroleum products, and nutrients and toxics found in lawn care and gardening products from running into the Village's drainage systems.

To meet the program's goals, the Village is asking residents to get involved and help. Detailed information can be found on the Village website. Here are some ways you can help:

You can help keep our environment clean by following the steps below:

1. **REPORT ILLEGAL PUMPING, DUMPING** or direct connection to a drain or waterway to the Nassau County Illicit Discharge Hotline (516) 571-6863.

2. **REFRAIN FROM FEEDING GEESE AND DUCKS** While we all love our "feathered friends", feeding them interrupts the natural migratory cycle. Birds that would normally migrate south in the winter to find food, take up residence if food is "artificially" provided.

3. **KEEP YOUR SEPTIC SYSTEM WELL MAINTAINED** Generally, you should have your septic system inspected at least every 3 years by a professional and your tank pumped as recommended by the inspector (generally every 3-5 years). Household chemicals, gasoline, oil, pesticides, antifreeze, paint, etc. should be taken to the Town S.T.O.P collection sites and not flushed.

4. **PROPER USE OF FERTILIZERS and PESTICIDES ON YOUR LAWN AND GARDEN** If you think you must use heavy amounts of pesticides to grow a beautiful lawn, think again. A bright green, weed-free lawn can be yours by mowing your lawn only as needed, watering wisely, and using slow-release organic fertilizers.

5. **DISPOSE OF YOUR HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTES AT A TOWN SITE** the Town of Oyster Bay hosts its S.T.O.P. ("Stop Throwing Out Pollutants") program throughout the year, for more information call the Town at (516) 677-5748.
